<u>S ignificant Findings</u>: The female segmentation should be investigated and monitored further as course completion rates range from 18.5% to 5.3% lower than their male counterparts, with an an average of 13.9% lower over the past five academic years. Additionally, African Americans are performing at a lesser rate than other segmentations, completing courses at the lowest rate for 2014-15, with a span of 2.9% to 5.8% lower than the next higher completing segmentation. African Americans also have the second and third lowest of 11 segmentations for all other years, ranging from 6%, 5.5%, and 0.6% lower than the next higher completing segmentation. In addition, 2018-2019 data shows 10% drop in success rates from 2017-18 for females.

<u>Conclusions and Next Steps</u>: In 2018-2019, completion rates declined in all but two categories, Hawaiian/Nat Amer and Veterans, which had increases of 3.8 and 14.4 percentage points, respectively. The categories that show the steepest decline in the final year of the period studied are Female and African American: 9.8 and 7.8 percentage points, respectively. It would be helpful to see how the division rates compare to other individual divisions and the District as a whole.

Over the reporting period, there have not been major gaps which need to be addressed. Due to dialog sparked by SLO data, the most important changes were (1) adoption of lower-cost OER texts; (2) better internal communication with distance education office; (3) aligning all the benchmarks for success across all courses in the division to 70% (2016-2017); and (4) more robust supplemental instruction and assignments to address CLO areas of concern.
